As we return to school, we reflect on **Epiphany** and explore what it can mean to us as a school community as we review our new half-termly value of **thankfulness**.

The story of the Wise Men bringing gifts to baby Jesus reminds us of the importance of showing gratitude for the blessings in our lives, and we have started to encourage pupils to think about how they can demonstrate thankfulness in their daily actions.

What we've been up to



Key Stage One outdoor areas have been transformed

England Primary School became part of The Good Shepherd Trust (GST), a dynamic multi-academy trust that includes 24 schools across Surrey and Hampshire. With a mix of both Church of England and non-affiliated schools, GST's purpose is to create a thriving network where schools can collaborate, share resources, and work towards common values and goals. At the heart of this vision is the belief that success of every child in the trust's care.

GST is committed to providing an inclusive education for children of all faiths and backgrounds, with a shared mission to help each student flourish. The trust places a strong emphasis on offering a broad, enriching curriculum that caters to the diverse needs of every child. The vision aligns with the Church of England's ethos for education, young people, regardless of their faith, can grow and learn in a supportive, inclusive environment.

As part of the ongoing commitment to improvement, Cranleigh Primary School is also undergoing significant renovations. An independent building condition report, conducted by leading consultants Watts, identified key areas in need of attention. Over the next two years, the

school will benefit from a substantial £2 million investment aimed at improving its infrastructure. In the first phase of building works, completed in the Summer 2024, the school installed a new roof and made important upgrades to the heating system. Additionally, the Key Stage One outdoor area has been completely transformed, and one playground has been resurfaced. Plans to add new playground markings are underway, further enhancing the outdoor spaces for our children.

Earlier this year, the old Horsa Huts were demolished, and the school is working closely with Surrey County Council to create more outdoor space for students to enjoy. Looking ahead, Phase 2 of the works, which will begin in Spring 2025, will focus on improvements to the kitchens as well as upgrading internal and external doors and windows.



As we join The Good Shepherd Trust and continue to invest in our school's future, we look forward to a new chapter filled with growth, collaboration, and the opportunity to make a positive impact of the children and families

#### Cranleigh Choral Society



### **ATTENDANCE**

### **Penalty Notices**

If you take your children out of school without authorisation for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

- 1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- 2. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
  - 3. If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under section 444 of the Education Act 1996.



### What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

## AI VIRTUAL FRIENDS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Artificial intelligence — particularly in terms of how it generates natural language — has seen significant development over the last six months, with companies releasing new Al-based software or adding on Al element to existing apps (such as Snapchot, for example). One form of Al to become especially popular has been the "Al friend" or chatbot, as children eagerly experiment with these new found computer-generated companions. There are now numerous apps available with this virtual

### CONTENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Al chatbots may not always be able to recognise when content is oge inappropriate or hormful and should be filtered out. So there's a possibility that children could be exposed to offensive longuage or explicit material while conversing with their virtual triend. The companies producing such Al solutions are also unlikely to take responsibility for any content that their algorithms generate.

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### REDUCED SOCIAL CONTACT

An excessive relicance on chatbots for social interaction could potenticity cause a child to begin reducing the amount of face-to-face communication they have, leading to social isolation. If young people become dependent on chatbots to provide companionship, it could very likely hinder the development of their real-life social skills.

#### LACK OF SENSITIVITY

Chatbot software isn't always sophisticated enough to pick up on subtle emotional cues or recognise signs of distress in children, as most humans would, it might therefore fall to respond appropriately. Al misinterpreting what it's being told or replying insensitively to a young user who's already struggling could potentially impact a child's emotional wellbeing or exacerbate any existing emotional issues.

### BIAS

as the information they've been programmed with. The algorithms they use, therefore, may unintentionally promote blas, stereotypes or discriminatory behaviour (as many originate from the USA or the UK, for instance, they can display a distinctly western-centric worldview). This could lead to children developing skewed attitudes and behaviours.

#### COGNITIVE LIMITATIONS

Ilthough many are now underlable divenced, Al-powered chatbots till have limitations in terms of indestanding complex concepts, ontext and nuance. Depending early on chatbots to help with soming or solving problems may bunt the development of a child's win powers of critical thinking, reativity and ability to engage in pen-ended discussions with other pen-ended discussions with other

#### PRIVACY CONCERNS

Chatbots typically collect data about users, including personal information and conversations. This is astensibly to improve their performance as they gradually learn about our behaviour – but many experts are warning that there may be significant risks associated with how this information is stored and used (the possibility of potential breaches or misuse by third parties, for instance).



## Advice for Parents & Carers

#### CHAT ABOUT CHATBOTS

If your child is already expressing on interest in Arapps, a relaxed, natural chat should help you to discover which ones they're aware of and how they're using them (or are planning to). Discuss these options with your child and perhaps do your own research to ensure you think they're suitable. Once you're totally happy, you could sit with your young one and begin exploring Al chatbots together.

#### CREATE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT

If your child is keen to engage with AI chatbots, encourage them to do so in a safe environment: ideally in a shared space at home, so you can easily keep an eye and ear on their progress. Set up appropriate content filtering measures in advance – and gently remind them that you'll be close by and ready to help with any questions or concerns that may arise.

#### FIND A BALANCE

Work alongside your child to establish the right balance in terms of how they might use Al-powered charbots - and when it's appropriate. It's important to make sure that children are still getting plenty of opportunities to learn to solve problems for themselves, as well as building their interpersonal skills through face to face conversations with triends family members and teachers.

#### TAKE CONTROL

As with any form of app or game, when it comes to Al chatbots we'd strongly recommend that you consider employing parental controls (either on the device being used or within the software litself) to manage which apps your child can download and use. This is particularly important for younger children, who may be more at risk of being upset or frightened by inappropriate content.


#### RECOGNISE THE RISKS


It's unlikely that most children will have even considered the potential risks attached to having a virtual companion. So it's probably wise to explain some of the possible hazards and challenges of Al chatbots to your child. In particular, emphasise that Al isn't a real person (however much it might sound like one) and may occasionally fell them something that and explicit importation recovering.
